My most recent fiction film as a director & writer, "Black Car Home" (see film at www.blackcarhome.com), about migration and homelessness was shown in several festivals including the BAFTA qualifying LSFF 2015 and was distributed in six cinemas by Arturi Films. Films and TV programmes I have directed: Baglady, Whose House Is It Anyway, the Change of Sex series, the disability polemics for Comic Relief, and the cinema feature I produced, Mugabe and the White African, have prompted debate and helped lead to changes in policy eg (more appropriate support for street homeless, and more sympathetic treatment of transsexuals).

I am a flexible, versatile, award winning writer and director TV director (Nominations include BAFTA, Grierson, Prix Nicki, winner of RTS, FIPA, & Glenfiddich etc) currently attached to direct two cinema films Brother of All Battles, and the documentary How Disaster Improved My Life, (the latter developed with FFilm Cymru Wales). I have written and directed some thirty full-length TV documentaries that provoke debate and action, many of them award winners, on a diverse range of subjects all over the world (eg France, USA, Turkey, Canada, Iraq, Russia, Zimbabwe etc) as well as numerous other TV genres including short dramas, entertainment & food programmes etc. & a full list is available on demand. In 2017 I developed with Red Arrow Media, Cove & Storyspring directing a feature length film follow up based on my earlier BBC2 audience winning series A Change of Sex. I am producer and co-screenwriter of The Hum a UK/ Canadian co-production with Arturi Films in development with Telefilm support, a thriller set in Quebec and co-written by myself and director Isabelle Raynauld. My films are about strong characters, injustice, identity and fairness and often have trans or female lead characters as in the Black Car Home, Baglady, The Hum. Brother of All Battles, and A Change of Sex.

I founded and programmed the acclaimed **International Screenwriters Festival** which attracted Oscar and BAFTA winning talent from all over the world including William Nicholson (Gladiator, Shadowlands), Guillermo Del Toro (Hellboy, Pan's Labyrinth) & James Schamus (Brokeback Mountain), I have lectured on production and directing, NFTS, Falmouth University, Manchester University & the Swedish Film Institute and now lecture on screenwriting and directing at Reading University on its MA and BA programmes.
